




It is a water place




A Place

Where most bright colors come from a can






Where the air is still




And the water is a canvas






Of subtle rewards in secret places

Until 2003 when the road was completed, Caleta Tortel was accessible only by sea.

The community is linked by a network of 5.6 kilometers / 3.5 miles of cypress walkways.

There is still a barter economy based on the rare wood harvested on the surrounding islands.
