But of all the thousands who flock to La Tirana.






Most come for the color,




The dancing,

But not all are in La Tirana for the snapshots.




Others are here for different reasons, higher reasons.

Because, after all, La Tirana isn't just a festival, it's a religious festival.


A festival for the Virgin del Carmen.
